

This book is available in paperback, hardcover, and Kindle.


This story is about a father who plays hide-and-seek with his little girl. He calls all of the creatures of the jungle to help find his baby in his tender, noisy and gloriously.

This book is available in paperback, hardcover, and Kindle.


This book is about a mother who asks animals, from the smallest mosquito to the biggest elephant, to be quiet and not disturb the sleeping baby.


This book is available in hardcover and Kindle.




*The Girl Who Wore Too Much* tells the story about a spoiled girl named Aree. She cannot decide which of her many silken dresses and lavish jewels to wear to the dance, so she wears them all. She learns that excess can be a burden, and that impressing friends is not the same as keeping them.

This book can be used as a read-aloud to ELLs as part of a discussion about cultural awareness and appreciating differences as part of multicultural books collection.

*The Gold-Threaded Dress* is the story about a little Thai girl Oy who has started at a new school in America. Oy faces many difficulties trying to fit in at school. To begin with, her teacher calls her Olivia, her American name, instead of Oy. In addition, a boy in her class, Frankie, keeps saying that she is Chinese and the many Mexican-American students at the school begin to call her Chinita (Spanish). The situation becomes worse when Liliandar, the most popular girl in class, sees a picture of Oy in a beautiful Thai dress and offers her membership into her exclusive club only if Oy brings the dress to school for her to try on.

This book can be used as a read-aloud to ELLs as part of a discussion about cultural awareness and appreciating differences. Students will be able to relate to the issues the book deals with, such as peer pressures and wanting to fit in. They are also beginning to develop empathy for others, and will show concern for Oy's feelings.

WIDA: Expanding to Bridging


Grade Level: 2.5

One day Ta-in catches one fish and brings it home. Ta-na does not catch a fish, but he wants to get the middle part of the fish so they begin to disagree and fight. The old man, Ta-yoo intervenes and helps them solve the problem. He takes the middle part of the fish. Ta-in and Ta-na realize that they are greedy so they learn to compromise and become good friends again.

This book can be used to Read-aloud to ELLs in a whole group or individual reading. Because this story is from Thailand, it would be great component of any multicultural folktale studies unit. This book can use to teach great problem solving, cooperation and share.

This book is available in hardcover, paperback, and Kindle.


